Dear Scouters,

Retention is receiving a lot of attention these days. National BSA track this indicator and there is good reason. Retention measures how many Scouts stay in the program from one year to the next. It most directly affects membership growth, but the underlying **cause** of good or bad retention can be found in many areas.

The most obvious reason would seem to be a good quality program. If Scouts are having fun, and their parent's perceive good value in their child participating in Scouting, then they are much more likely to continue through the next year in Scouting. But there are many, many influencers in the quality of a Scouting program. Trained leaders, robust advancement, exciting outdoor program, weekend

camping, long term camping, recognition, good weekly meetings, and quality adult role models are some of the most important ones.

Why is retention important? Because we know for a fact that the longer a youth stays in Scouting, the more positive attributes he or she acquires. Scouts who are in for 5 or more years benefit more from the character development, citizenship training and physical and mental fitness that is Scouting. Also with increased tenure comes a more positive view of Scouting, which helps in recruiting.

Take a little time in your world of Scouting to look at ways to improve the retention of Scouts. Focus on one or more of the above listed influencers that you can help improve in your Cub Scout Pack, Scouts BSA Troop, or Venture Crew. The Scouts will benefit from your effort.



Leaders can also see their training status in their my.Scouting account under My Training. Direct Contact Leaders must complete Hazardous Weath-

Hazardous Weather Training

Frequently Asked Questions

In 2017, Hazardous Weather Training was made mandatory for all Direct Contact Leaders, however completion of this training has not been properly reflected in the training reports. Effective the week of December 2, 2024 this training will be reflected in training reports. We've created this FAQ to help answer some questions you may have.

Is Hazardous Weather Training mandatory for registration or renewal of Scouting America membership?

No, Hazardous Weather Training does not impact an individual's registration with Scouting America.

Who is required to complete Hazardous Weather Training?

All Direct Contact Leaders are required to complete Hazardous Weather Training to be considered "trained" in their position.

Can Hazardous Weather Training be conducted in an in-person setting?

NO. Hazardous Weather Training can ONLY be completed using the on-line modules offered through my.Scouting

Is it recommended for all adult leaders attending outdoor events to complete this training?

It is recommended that any adult leader, who is attending an outdoor event, with a unit, complete Hazardous Weather Training.

Does Hazardous Weather Training expire?

Hazardous Weather Training is valid for two years.

How will leaders be notified about the expiration of their Hazardous Weather Training?

Leaders will receive an email notification of their expiration date, from my.scouting (similar to Youth Protection emails). Leaders can also see their training status in their my.Scouting account under My Training. Direct Contact Leaders must complete Hazardous Weather training every two years to retain "trained" status.





RULES AND REGULATIONS of the BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA

Article X, Section 6, Clause 3 Silver Beaver Award

The Boy Scouts of America, acting through the National Court of Honor, may award the Silver Beaver for distinguished service to youth upon the following basis and procedure:

- a) Each local council may process their own annual allotment of Silver Beaver awards and shall send a list of Silver Beaver recipients presented each calendar year to the National Court of Honor no later than January 31 of the following year.
- b) The award is made for noteworthy service of exceptional character to youth by registered Scouters, Cub Scouters, Varsity Scouters, and Venturing leaders within the territory under the jurisdiction of a local council.
- c) As evidence of the award there shall be presented: a suitable certificate, duly authenticated by the Boy Scouts of America, pursuant to the action of the National Court of Honor; and a miniature Silver Beaver suspended by a blue, white, and blue ribbon to be worn around the neck.
- It shall be a general policy that no public announcements shall be made by the local council in advance of action by the National Court of Honor with reference to names presented for consideration.
- These awards shall be made to the recipients by the local council concerned in connection with its annual meeting or other public location.
- f) Each duly chartered local council shall be entitled to one nomination. Councils having more than 60 units shall be entitled to further nominations on the basis of one for each additional 60 units or fraction thereof in their territory, as of December 31 preceding the nomination, according to the records of the national office.
- g) Councils not using their full allotment in any year may accumulate the unused portion for use in any subsequent year.
- h) In extraordinary cases, the Silver Beaver Award may be made by the National Court of Honor to a Scouter upon the recommendation of the duly constituted Scouting authorities having supervision of one or more units of the Boy Scouts of America, located outside of the United States and not under the jurisdiction of a local council.
